## **Remembrance Sunday**

## Warley Place

The conservatory at Warley Place is now being re-stabilised. The work should be finished by Christmas, and certainly in time for the Spring Bulb Spectacular weekends. It will be so good to be able to walk through the conservatory again and to use it as a resting place. We thank the Essex Wildlife Trust for obtaining the grants to enable this work to be done.

The flat walk suitable for wheelchairs round part of the reserve is now almost complete. It winds through the rockery area between the old stables and the road. The main front gate to Warley Place has been permanently removed so that motorists who use wheelchairs can access the main car park without having to open the front gate.

Work is underway to re-establish the 'Slip Garden' (outside the south side of the walled garden). Thanks to a generous bereavement donation, pollinating shrubs and perennials will be planted here. The former have been selected and will arrive by the end of November.

Twenty one additional native trees are to be planted in the two meadows during December. Each will have a protection guard structure to protect it from the deer and from the cattle in summer.

More volunteers are always needed to help with the car parking or to welcome visitors during the Spring Bulb Spectacular weekends. If YOU are able to help just for a couple of hours, please email me on <u>fionaagas-</u> <u>siz@hotmail.com</u>.

## **Headley Common**

The Trustees for Headley Common have met with Dave Bigden, Joint General Director of Thames Chase and at a recent full trustees meeting with Alex Hewitt (Thames Chase Senior Programmes Officer) have agreed on three days of maintenance work with their team of volunteers.

On Tuesday 14th November Alex arrived with 14 volunteers for work along the Common on the west side of Warley Road. The wide verge from

Great Ropers Lane to The Fat Turk restaurant is part of the Common. We concentrated on the part from Great Ropers Lane to the turning in front of Felix. With rakes and long handled leaf grabs, the volunteers collected many bushels of leaves. When the leaves were removed a team on their hands and knees armed with trowels planted 300 daffodil bulbs.

Alex Hewitt said that 300 bulbs are enough for this late planting trial and we will see how it goes and if successful we will looking at planting 2,000 bulbs in October next year. This first day's work with Thames Chase volunteers has been a great success although the weather was not at all kind to us.

I have only been involved with Headley Common for 20 years and this is the first bulb planting I can recall in all those years. You will need to ask Fiona Agassiz or Len Fryatt who will know when the first bulb planting took place!

#### **MAVIS WRIGHT RIP**

## Mavis Wright 1931 – 2023

Mavis Kathleen Wright, lately of Hole Farm, was born on 18<sup>th</sup> November 1931. She had three older brothers, William, Maurice and Ian, plus an adopted brother Gordon. She left school at 15 and started her first job in the local chemist which was a short walk from her family home. She also worked in a department shop where she learnt to fold towels in the correct way.

Mavis had a few boyfriends before she met her future husband Anthony Reginald Wright at the local fairground. She was there with her best friend Ada and Tony was there with his best friend Jeff. The girls were offered rides home on the boys' motorbikes, rather than waiting for the bus to arrive. They went with the boys, and both eventually married them.

Mavis married Tony in Chalfont St Giles on 26<sup>th</sup> April 1952, and they were together for 66 years until Tony died in 2019. They had three children, Janet, Julie and Stephen.

At first Mavis seemed to enjoy the life of a farmer's wife, baking cakes and making jam, collecting the eggs and being a perfect housewife. Unfortunately, this did not last after she realised that the life of a farmer's wife started before 5.30am and ended at 8.30pm when Tony went to bed. She then learned to drive, however, and she found work doing in-store promotions at local supermarkets.

In 1972 the family moved to Hole Farm, Great Warley, with Tony's brother Peter and his wife Jenny. It was an opportunity for them to manage a larger farm than the small holdings which they each held in Dedham. Mavis again found promotional work, and she joined local clubs including playing Badminton and Croquet.

Mavis's greatest love was for antiques. She loved jewellery and everything which glistened. She went to boot fairs and antiques markets, and often came home having bought more than she sold. She was a great hoarder! She loved to travel, and she used to spend many months visiting her scattered family. She adored her four grandchildren and five great grandchildren.

Mavis also adored animals. She hand-reared calves which were sick and which had been abandoned by their mothers. She put up with countless cats and kittens, dogs, guinea pigs, rabbits, ducks, geese, turkeys, peacocks, guinea fowls and chickens.

Mavis became very much part of the local community in Great Warley. She cooked for harvest suppers and barbecues and helped to run a stall at the village fayres. She was a good friend to many people in the village, and she is already very much missed.

Mavis was 91 when she died on 3<sup>rd</sup> September this year. Unfortunately she suffered a stroke in March and another in July. Her health then went downhill and she spent her last days in St Francis Hospice where angels attended to her every need. Members of her family are so grateful to the staff for their care.

Mavis's funeral was held on 27<sup>th</sup> September at St Mary's Church, followed by a burial in the churchyard and then by a reception at the de Rougemont Manor Hotel.

# GWCS meeting 23<sup>rd</sup> November

The bi-annual meeting took place as usual at the Rectory Hall and was well attended. A number of local environmental and planning issues were discussed including :- The De Rougemont Hotel where the consented development is not proceeding at this point in time and the hotel remains open. Concerns were again voiced at the potentially dangerous location of the proposed access to the Forest England facilities on Great Warley Street where no proposal for road speed limiting or sight line improvement is being made in the planning application and it is mentioned Brentwood Council will be responsible for maintaining the hedgerows and verges. Local requests for maintenance of existing paths and verges have not been actioned by the Council and Cllr Jay Laplain cited staffing problems. An update was given on the Five Acre Field saga and the Council process and commitment explained to the meeting. The Society has opposed the application for three new houses in the garden of Coombe on Warley Road and asked that the Highway authority look at the application as it is on a dangerous stretch of the PR 1 road.

Discussion took place about the future Lychgate circulation and a number of views and suggestions were made.

The Brentwood Enterprise Park transport assessment was referred to as not being feasible as currently drafted and, if the scheme proceeds, the Village must secure some means of traffic flow restrictions. Cllr Laplain agreed to investigate the damaged speed roundel opposite the cricket club which the community wants repaired following damage by a falling tree over a year ago. He also kindly agreed to assist over the issue of increased traffic on Dark Lane as it registers as a satnav route if others are busy.

It has been agreed we will have another "Village Picnic" at the cricket club next Summer on Monday 27th May.
